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A number of revisions are proposed to the Board's Uniform Standards Related to Substance Abuse and Disciplinary Guidelines. In addition, there are changes proposed to several regulation sections related to the enforcement process.

- The Board had approved many of these changes back in 2015. However, due to legislation that affected some of the proposed changes, this package was held. During the time it was being held, additional changes have been identified and are included in the proposal.

  - Minimum Years of Probation
  - The Committee discussed the categories with a minimum of 5-year probation and agreed to leave those categories at the 5-year minimum length of probation.

  education, as it relates to a clinician's duties, is different than what it would
  be in the rehabilitation program.
